New Developments

Residential Services:

We plan to open 4 homes in the North East Area (DDS Region 3), which will provide new homes to 16 people – we have identified the homes for the first 2 of these projects, one will be located in Methuen, MA and the other will be in Haverhill, MA.

For Cape Cod, we are planning to re-open our home in Marstons Mills, and are working to open homes 3 and 4 in Orleans as part of the Cape Cod Village project.

It will be a very busy year of new development for us at The NEEDS Center, and our plan is to take a bit of a break in terms of expansion projects within Massachusetts in 2024.


Day Services:

We opened our 3rd Massachusetts based, and fourth overall (Florida) Day Program on April 3rd. The people receiving support in this program have been very happy with the new location to date.

We are currently looking for a suitable site on Cape Cod that will be able to serve as a Community Based Day Support (CBDS) program, that we hope to identify soon. This program will be designed to support the people who live in NEEDS Center Residences in: Orleans, Sandwich and Marstons Mills. We will keep you posted on this as we move along.

Our Day Services



Michael Sobezenski, Director of Day Services

As Director of Day Services, Michael is responsible for overseeing and maneuvering the daily operations of day services which include day programs located in Tewksbury, Rowley, and Beverly. His role entails a myriad of responsibilities across many levels. On one level, there are duties related to client services which include attending ISP meetings, ensuring the implementation of clinical and educational programming, regularly communicating with families/guardians, and providing on-call assistance for transportation to name a few. On another level, there are personnel-related duties such as payroll, interviewing candidates, approving personal time off requests for staff, conducting performance evaluations, and so forth. Mike is also responsible for the direct supervision of program coordinators and assistants and works cooperatively with them to manage daily operations.



Timothy Sobezenski, Vice President of Day Services

As Vice President of Day Services, Tim has many responsibilities and duties. Some essential duties include relaying information about business objectives and company policies and attending meetings at various levels. Among Tim's most important responsibilities is supporting the senior leadership personnel at the day programs. This includes the Director, Program Coordinators, and assistant program coordinators. For Tim to perform his job efficiently he must be aware of all operations, any issues, and news. Thus, Tim regularly meets and communicates with the Director and Program Coordinators. He helps them set goals and ensures that plans are being followed through. Additional responsibilities include maintaining the budget and tracking expenditure/transactions, scheduling and organizing team meetings, providing feedback and guidance to the Director and Program Coordinators, and facilitating and conducting the intake and discharge process. While many of the core responsibilities have been listed, this is not an exhaustive list.

Our Residential Services

There have been a lot of exciting happenings in the residential programs over the last few months, such as 4 new admissions, vacation planning for the residents, quality improvements to the houses, and the hiring or several new staff. We had a few programs take trips to New York and Florida, and we are looking at planning similar trips or overnights for all of our residents. Our maintenance team has been very busy with renovation projects including updating kitchens, bathrooms, and common areas in many of the programs- more to come in all programs.

Breakdown of management responsibilities for each program:

- Assistant Program Coordinator- is looked at as the manager on shift and is responsible for day-to-day communication while at the program.
- Program Coordinator- is the house manager and is responsible for all resident activities, staff, and day-to-day functions within the program
- Senior Program Coordinator- helps to oversee 2-3 residential programs and has direct oversight of the Program Coordinator

Through it all, however, Ali has always been upbeat, patient, positive, and brave. She leads an active life, filled with volunteer service, horseback riding, snowshoeing, swimming, bowling and taking long walks. An active participant in Special Olympics, Ali also loves music and going to concerts and movies. A big breakthrough came when Ali was 12 and they learned that underneath the cloud of autism, there was a bright girl with a great sense of humor who was developing in many ways like a typical teenager. Since then, the iPad has made communication that much easier in addition to offering many other benefits.


